Laverne recalls childhood days of having no electricity and lighting the way by oil lamp. Not having a fridge to keep things cold also meant her mom had to store their fresh milk in the creek just to keep it from spoiling. And if they wanted a new outfit, out came the sewing machine.

It's hard not to compare her growing up stories to the ones of "Little House on the Prairie." She quite literally walked 3 miles to school, uphill, both ways. And weather (and farm life) permitting, their whole family would walk that same route to the schoolhouse on Sunday mornings for church.

When her sister married a "neighbor" boy who lived 4-5 miles across the creek, she

would visit them often. It was there she met and became fast friends with her brotherin-law's younger brother, Bill. Childhood friendship eventually turned into love, and she would end up saying "I do" to her playmate.

Bill and Laverne married and settled quickly into building their own homestead . . . a life that very few these days can understand or appreciate. And while the physical landscape and structures have changed over the years, there's evidence everywhere you look of the life they built for themselves and their two boys.

In fact, when you pull into Laverne's driveway, you're quick to notice two large chicken houses, worn and rustic from age and weather. Old wooden barns are tucked in the corner of the property as well, and one gets to wondering what tools used to hang on the walls in those structures.

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She and Bill worked hard to provide for their family. They milked cows - 8 at a time, 2x a day - for a few years before they decided to raise chickens. And raising a family on a chicken farm isn't for the weak . . . especially during a time when automated feeders weren't the norm and houses had to be kept warm in ways that increased the risk of fires (which ended up claiming one of their houses).

The day-to-day needs of their animals kept them busy and rarely allowed for a weekend off; let alone

complain as she shares these stories. In fact, she recounts the memories with a smile on her face and a sense of pride in her heart. You see, Bill built the place she calls "home" in the prime of their lives. She shares, like so many others have, "We never thought about things like having a bathroom door that's wide enough to get a walker through." And really, who does?

Well, God does!

He knew that, one day, Laverne would need someone else to "light the oil lamp" for her. He knew she would need a bathroom that would reduce her risk of falling and improve her quality of life. And He knew who He

would use to make that happen!

In the same way that their homestead has changed over time, so have their lives and their health. Bill passed away in 2002. And Laverne faces growing mobility challenges that require the regular use of a walker and wheelchair ramp. It wasn't until she experienced multiple falls getting in and out of the shower, however, that she decided it was time to ask for help.

Facebook friends raised money for the walk-in shower insert. A local couple asked others to help fund her door-widening project in honor of their anniverary (blessings to you, Michael and Amanda Barnett). And community leaders like Jim Hendren (Arkansas State Senator, pictured below right) and Netzel Cabinets gave of their hard-earned resources to make sure all her home modification needs were met.

A faith-based fitness gym CLIMBS MOUNT EVEREST

to raise money for local seniors

This Fall, the Upward Fitness community participated in a **unique stair-climbing fundraiser** to raise money for seniors and individuals impacted by mobility impairments.

Erik Leetch, gym owner, challenged Upward teams of various sizes to make at least 492 trips up the infamous JBU stairs . . . the distance equivalent to summiting Mt. Everest at 29,029 feet. Participating "climbers" then asked friends & family to financially support their "expedition" by making a donation to Kind at Heart.

Altogether, their community "ascended the mountain" 15 times! That's equivelant to 751, 541 steps...



When asked about why he chose to do the Everest Challenge, Erik had this to say:

"Upward Fitness is so much more than a gym, so finding ways to pour back into our community is important to us... Our desire was to take Kind at Heart's "Step It Up" campaign and add visibility to it by means of "climbing Mt.
